Move For Health



Neighbourhood Grant Program - Celebration and Activity Grant

The City's Celebration and Activity Grant Program got off to a fast and energetic start during the second quarter of 2016, with several events occurring.

The Beaufort and Currie Block Party was the first to be funded under this program and it attracted 49 neighbours. The organizers were thrilled that the City of Chilliwack and Council started this program, and were thankful for the contributions the City made to their event. Saturday June 11th saw the second annual Art Under the Umbrella event hosted, by the Chilliwack Community

Arts Council at Central Community Park. That Local Market kicked off its inaugural event the same morning and partnered with the Arts Council, providing a mutual value-add to each others event.

As if June 11th wasn't busy enough; this day also saw a pair of block parties take place; one on Windsor Street and one on Topley Avenue. The Windsor Street party was unique in that it included live entertainment from their senior residents. The event hosts


expressed appreciation to the City not only for their funding support but also for providing resources that closed off the street, making the party safe for the 75 plus people who attended.

The Topley Avenue block party was fortunate to have had a visit from Safety Bear, who handed out pamphlets on street safety to the children in attendance. Approximately 55 people joined in on a barbeque hosted in one of the neighbour's back yard.

The last event of the second quarter that was funded under the Celebration and Activity program was the Promontory Heights Elementary School Community Build Day. This resulted in several raised boxes being constructed for a

community garden for the students and residents in the area to enjoy. In spite of the

rain, students, parents, teachers, and volunteers helped build eight garden beds in all. Approximately 20 kids and 50 adults helped make the day a success.














Rosedale Traditional Community School Society

The facility hosted several exciting events during the second quarter of 2016. A Craft Market, several fundraisers for missionary work, a guitar recital, and a piano recital were all hosted in the facility. The society consistently welcomes community members to the facility for their special events and celebrations. Once again the society partnered with DASHbc, which provided free afterschool programs. This session saw participants from ages 6-12 years of age attending karate, mixed medium art, and ukulele. It's always a pleasure to be able to provide programs to families who may not have an opportunity otherwise. The ever popular Friday Night Drop In Youth Night celebrated the school year end with the group of youth playing bubble soccer. Attendance for this quarter was 5,300.









Greendale Elementary Community School

For April – June, the attendance during the programming at Greendale Elementary Community School remained steady. The majority of the "after school programs" ended the first week or two of June, with two long-term rentals continuing through the summer (Little Kickers Soccer and yoga).

Offered once again this quarter was the ASSAI (After School Sports & Arts Initiative) program which ran a 4-8 week session and allowed children to attend at no cost. Participants received a healthy after school snack and then participated in either sports or music instruction. Watching the children progress throughout the year because of the ASSAI program was very rewarding.

The summer programming is underway and slots are filling up for Acting Drama Camp, Xtreme Sports Camps, Gymnastic Camps and Science Camp. There is currently 45 children registered for the various camps.

130+ children preschool aged and above, attended regular weekly programs. This included karate, Acting Outright, music and sports programming, Little Kickers Soccer, children's yoga, skipping, and gymnastics.

80+ adults attended regular weekly programs; including Community Pop-In, yoga, karate and a variety of fitness programs.

Special events included a Home Alone Course that attracted 13 children and GECSS partnered with the Greendale PAC for a community family event at the Chilliwack Corn Maze at the end of April.



Yarrow Community School Society

Spring was very busy and fun at the Yarrow Community School. Recently the adult activities have almost been on par with the kids and family activities, which is not typical for the site. On an ongoing and weekly basis there has been strong support for Zumba, pilates, boot camps, men's floor hockey and Pickleball. Even the men's basketball had a pretty good showing until the Toronto Raptors made it deep into the playoffs!

The Filipino Basketball League wrapped up their three month session with league playoffs that coincided with a big Filipino Independence Day celebration at the site which had over 200 people in attendance.

The Spring Auction co-hosted by the School PAC and Community School was a great success, raising \$14,000. A portion of this funding will go towards supporting future community school programs.

The ASSAI (After School Arts and Sports Initiative) programs, sponsored by the provincial government included 'Rock the Uke' and archery this last quarter. The archery was so popular that another fully subscribed summer session will be starting soon.

The Community School sponsored garden program was expanded, and there is now a Native Edibles garden bed. A greenhouse will be erected soon during the Family Build Day. The onsite garden is tended daily by the daycare kids. In return for watering and harvesting they get to enjoy a wide variety of produce. A UFV Science student completed some of her work studies by helping with the school's Smoothie Days and assisting with a Mason Bee Workshop led by an extremely knowledgeable and caring senior expert from the Yarrow community.

A full slate of summer programming fills the calendar until late August, and then there will be a bit of a break to get ready for September.

Chilliwack Central Elementary Community School Society

This quarter, CCECSS amalgamated its two after school programs the After School Sports and Arts Initiative and the 2nd Day After School program into one program which remained called the 2nd Day. This program is headed into its sixth year and grew from originally only being located in one school to now servicing four schools in the downtown area. The primary focus of 2nd Day is on Arts & Sports community driven programming, partnership development, and supports for students facing barriers. The enhancements made this year were done to better service the downtown schools and their families which included the program being divided into three separate sessions (Fall, Winter and Spring). The new model allowed the program to go from servicing 50 students all year long to 225 for the entire year. All three sessions included 2nd Day running three days a week at Central partnering with students from McCammon, one day a week at Bernard, and one day a week at Robertson for the twelve week session. Students were able to take formal lessons in: music learning the guitar, flute, saxophone and claret; choir lessons; swimming lessons at the YMCA; Aboriginal art classes; skating lessons at Prospera; puppetry; dance lessons; and multi sports including tennis, lacrosse, basketball and ringette. CCECSS gratefully acknowledges the funding received by the City of Chilliwack to help support the 2nd Day program.







Promontory Heights Elementary Community School

Promontory Heights Elementary Community School Association enjoyed a busy, fun, winter session of afterschool programs. Spring programs offered included: floor hockey, pilates, yoga, video game design and a program called Baking Buddies.

PHECSA's drop-in programs continued to be a great success! "Tween Night" which was held on Friday evenings, for youth in grades 5 – 7 was supported greatly by the parents with many noting that the program offers kids the chance to socialize with their peers in a safe and fun environment. The Busy Bees caregiver/parent & tot program was often at full capacity and numbers had to be capped at 15 families each week due to limited space. This wonderful program offered a variety of themed crafts and story time, plus lots of free play time, all the while providing participants with a chance to connect with others in the community. The Primetimers program saw an increase in membership and served approximately 20 participants per week. This weekly drop-in group provided seniors with a chance to enjoy conversation and coffee. The private piano lessons operated at full capacity, and a waitlist had to be created. This quarter PHECSA started a drop in Pickleball program every Tuesday and it proved to be very popular. Overall PHECSA had approximately 920 participants for the second quarter of 2016.

This event began two years ago and was hugely successful. The ever popular Vintage Bark Market and Paton Farm Auction rounded out the month of April. Chilliwack Library

The Chilliwack Library, in partnership with Chilliwack Community Services, conducted library tours to seven groups of newcomers to the Chilliwack community. Through the Chilliwack Newcomers Connection the Library hosted a tour of the library and promoted the services offered to the public for Syrian Refugees. There were 15 refugees and two instructors and all received library cards. The library also hosted six tours to newcomers to BC who are learning English. This

The library also hosted six tours to newcomers to BC who are learning English. This totaled 88 adults and 16 children. The tours accommodated a wide variety of English levels from Level 1 English - (using pictures/actions, speak very slowly, most can follow simple instructions, students will not say much, hands-on learning is proven to be best) through to Level 5/6 English (very competent in understanding, speaking and writing English as well as being confident in carrying on a conversation). This promotion of the library to newcomers was made possible through the library staff attending and participating in Sharing is Caring, sponsored by Chilliwack Newcomers Connection. The staff was able to meet collectively with refugee sponsors and community support groups to promote library resources available. More comfort was felt in using the library as they came as a part of a group and received personalized customer service for their needs. Many participants in this program have established some friendships with staff so that they feel at home when they visit the library.





Sardis Library





The Sardis Library continued to revamp its programs in response to the needs of young families in the community. A few Moms with young babies approached the Librarian, asking if there was any space available to meet and play during the week. Arrangements were quickly made to offer drop-in baby-time sessions with the opportunity to socialize afterwards. Fridays at Sardis this quarter began with between 25 and 30 moms and babies coming together for fun and frolic from 10:30 am – 11am.

The Sardis Library has also recently been the appreciative recipient of a number of grants from the community, including: \$530 received from the Sardis Quilters Group (to purchase quilting books for children and adults), \$250 received from the Chilliwack Lions Club, and \$443.45 received for the Early Family Literacy program and from a Raise a Reader grant provided by the Chilliwack Learning Society.

School visits began in preparation for The "Book a Trip" themed 2016 Summer Reading Club. Library staff and Benjamin the puppet attended a number of elementary school year end assemblies to encourage children to sign up for this popular program.



Yarrow Library

During this quarter two areas in the library received upgrades; the CD shelving area and the children's area. Four new CD music roll-out shelves were replaced with standard shelving to enable customers to browse the library's CD collection with ease. The children's shelving was dismantled and upgraded with new gables to raise each shelf unit to hold more books for both collection expansion and display purposes.

The Yarrow Library hosted the Chilliwack Reading Link Library Challenge in April, a friendly competition where 12 local schools came together for the "Final Challenge." All teams were required to answer questions about the Reading Link Challenge books that students had read over a period of five months. The winner this year was Vedder Chandinators, from Vedder Elementary. The Vedder Chandinators went on to compete in the FVRL Community Challenge where they were pitted against the winning teams from eight other communities in the Fraser Valley Regional Library system.

Yarrow Library also celebrated "International Edible Book Day" by hosting its own event. Customers were invited to bring in their own book-related edible displays. There was an adult, youth and family category. Each entry was judged on creativity, book-relevancy, and age.

During this quarter the library offered the usual regular programs, such as: Storytime, Babytime, LEGO Club, Book Club as well as some FVRL System-Wide programs. In summary, during this busy second quarter the Yarrow library provided 28 programs to approximately 724 attendees.
