Species at risk profile: Coastal Giant Salamander, Dicamptodon tenebrosus

What it looks like:

A large-sized salamander (up to 35 cm) with a long, thick body, and mottled skin. <u>Click here for more identification details</u>.

Where it lives:

This salamander is found in the cool, clear streams and the forests of Vedder Mountain and the Chilliwack River Valley. <u>Visit this map for location details.</u>

What it eats:

Adults are predators that feed on insects, slugs, shrews, mice, and other salamanders.

What are its main threats in the Fraser Valley?

Mountainside habitat loss and disturbances.

Did you know?

- Is the largest salamander In Canada and found only in the Fraser Valley.
- Some adults never transform from their aquatic stage. Instead, they retain their gills and dark skin, living in the stream for the rest of their lives.
- Will make a barking or croaking sound when startled.
