Getting to know Chilliwack's Species at Risk

Species at risk profile: Short-Eared Owl, Asio flammeus

What it looks like:

A medium-sized owl with a brown spotted body (up to 44 cm) and a pale face with black outlined eyes. Click here for more identification details.

Where it lives:

Found in open areas, such as fields, meadows, and edges of marshes and rivers. It migrates over a vast area, overwintering in the Fraser Valley and more south. Breeding occurs further north. <u>Click here for more location details</u>.

What it eats:

A predator that mostly hunts rodents, particularly voles. Can also eat shrews and small birds.

What are its main threats in the Fraser Valley?

Habitat loss.

Did you know?

- The short 'ears' are tufts of feathers, while the real ears are hidden on the side of the head.
- A migratory owl that overwinters in the Fraser Valley delta and has been known to roost in flocks of 100 birds or more.
- It has a barking call when alarmed.
