
#### Cost Analysis Of Homelessness

As of 2013, <u>homelessness cost the Canadian economy \$7.05 billion annually</u> (up from <u>\$4.5-6 billion in 2007</u>). This includes provision of emergency shelters and community supports, but also accounts for the increased costs of emergency services (including fire, police and EMS), health care, the criminal justice system etc.

Significant research has been done that explores the cost of housing someone in jail, hospitals or the shelter system compared to housing them in social or supportive housing. The difference is quite shocking. In a 2005 study by Pomeroy which looked at costs in four Canadian cities, institutional responses (jails, hospitals etc.) cost \$66,000-\$120,000 annually, emergency shelters cost \$13,000-\$42,000 annually whereas supportive and transitional housing cost \$13,000-\$18,000 and affordable housing without supports was a mere \$5,000-\$8,000.

This cost analysis doesn't look at the social and human costs. Not only is putting someone in housing cheaper, it is also much more humane. The longer someone remains homeless the greater likelihood that their physical and mental health will deteriorate and there is an increased chance of an early death.





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

# Goal 1: Advocate for a Housing First program for Chilliwack

Establish a coordinated system for moving people out of homelessness or unsafe housing to housing that is safe, affordable, and appropriate for their needs as quickly as possible.






## What's needed?

- Affordable market rentals
- Rent subsidies
- Supportive housing
- Landlord supports
- Increased senior government funding for rent subsidies, outreach, and wrap around tenant support services / intensive case management

Goal 2: Increase the supply of affordable rental housing across the housing continuum



Goal 3: Increased coordination amongst agencies







- Avoid discharge from care to homelessness
- Focus programs on early intervention
- Address existing housing barriers
- Increase information sharing
- Chilliwack Connect services on an ongoing basis
- Follow-up system for local housing and support workers

Goal 4: Improve Health & Safety



- Multi-agency homeless outreach response to ensure individual and public safety
- Develop & implement strategies to deter exploitation & victimization of vulnerable individuals
- Continued building health & safety inspections

# ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES IN HOUSING

#### **MUNICIPAL**

- Establishes affordable housing policy, bylaws & zoning

- Funds housing projects, homeless outreach, rent subsidies, income assistance, health & social services
- Regulates assisted living housing and community care facilities

 Plans, funds, implements mental health, addiction prevention, withdrawal management

- Homelessness Partnering Strategy (housing & programs) for designated or rural communities
- CMHC market reports & mortgage loan insurance

- Initiate, sponsor, operate housing projects
- Delivers services

- Provides donations and volunteer time with non profits
- Assists with community acceptance of new housing projects
