Getting to know Chilliwack's Species at Risk

Species at risk profile: Western Screech-owl, *kennicottii* subspecies, *Megascops kennicottii kennicottii*

What it looks and sounds like:

A small owl with a brown-grey streaked compact body (up to 25.5 cm) with yellow eyes and small ear tufts. Call is a series of low whistles that <u>sounds like</u> an accelerating 'bouncing ball'. <u>Click here</u> for more identification details.

Where it lives:

Lives in mature low-elevation forests with mixed deciduous and coniferous trees. Historically found throughout the Fraser Valley, this owl is now located in only a few places.

What it eats:

A predator that hunts a variety of prey, including mice, shrews, birds, insects, frogs, salamanders, fish, and insects.

What are its main threats in the Fraser Valley?

Loss of suitable habitat. Predation by larger owls.

Did you know?

- Lives in the valley year-round.
- Depends on other birds, such as woodpeckers, to create their nesting cavities.
- Will use human-made nest boxes.
