





Operations – Incident Responses

Incident Responses

The Chilliwack Fire Department responded to 976 calls for service in the third quarter (2,490 year to date). This was an increase of 98 calls compared to this time in 2019. Incidents for this quarter included 125 fires, 138 motor vehicle incidents, 104 burning complaints, and 42 emergency medical aid calls. Thus far in 2020, the three leading calls for service were public service, alarms activated, and motor vehicle incident responses. These three incident response types accounted for 1,716 incidents or 69% of the total calls responded to date.










Vehicle Fire Incident, Charles Street September 2020

Fire Prevention - Public Education & Code Enforcement

The Chilliwack Fire Department is proactively working to reduce fire losses and injuries through education, engineering, code enforcement, and fire investigations.

Fire & Life Safety Education

A total of 54 fire and life safety sessions were delivered to the community thus far in 2020. In 2020 to date, 680 residents have been educated or trained in fire and life safety, and emergency preparedness. Fire and life safety education programs continue to be impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The public health and provincial state of emergency continues to restrict access to the fire hall, and our access to engage the community and deliver programs.

Code Enforcement

The department completed 233 fire and life safety inspections in this quarter, for a total of 520 thus far in 2020. These inspections include health and safety inspections with the Bylaw Department, RCMP, and BC Safety Authority.

Engineering

The department completed 44 plan and sprinkler reviews this quarter. Fire Department personnel also conducted numerous on-site inspections to ensure Fire Code compliance.

Fire Investigations / Losses

Second quarter fire losses were \$3,770,270 bringing the total dollar loss to \$6,819,305 thus far in 2020. There were 5 fire related injuries during this quarter. A total of 27 dollar loss structure fires occurred this quarter with 19 (or 70%) occurring in residential occupancies. Fire origin and cause investigations were completed to identify fire loss trends and focus our education efforts to prevent future losses.

Training

This quarter was a transition period for the training division. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we developed and adopted processes and procedures to safely restart our practical hands-on training through small team training sessions.

Technical Training

- **Pre-Hospital Care** is a large component of our training curriculum and includes regularly scheduled CPR, AED, Spinal and FR 3 courses.
- Forestry and Wildland/Urban Interface Firefighting firefighters reviewed forestry firefighting strategies and tactics, utilizing portable pumps and bladders.
- **Rope Rescue** firefighters conducted scenario-based training on the terrain in our community to better prepare themselves for slope rescues.
- **Driver Training** ongoing as drivers are certified to the IAPD Standards.
- Aerial Training aerial apparatus training continued.
- Vehicle Rescue firefighters trained on vehicle extrication techniques in accordance with NFPA 1006.


Educational Training

Emergency Preparedness

In the 3rd quarter of 2020, the Chilliwack Emergency Program continued efforts to remain current with the COVID-19 pandemic. With cases beginning to rise, business continuity planning will need to remain in focus as the pandemic progresses. Seasonal planning for fall flooding and extreme weather events also got underway in the 3rd quarter; the spring freshet earlier this year positioned the City well for any fall flooding as EMBC completed guidelines for all municipalities in BC with respect to flood protection operations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Wildfire activity continues to remain at a low level in the city, with recent precipitation and cooler temperatures significantly contributing to a lower risk of wildfires in the region. Early forecasts for this winter do indicate a potentially colder than normal winter with a possible increase of snow and winter storms.

Both the Chilliwack Amateur Radio Club and the Chilliwack Emergency Support Services Team met virtually to maintain physical distancing requirements and reduce exposure to these key emergency program members. The Chilliwack Emergency Support Services team was activated in early September to assist people affected by a residential structure fire.

Community Activities

The coronavirus pandemic continues to restrict the ability of fire department members to participate in community events and fundraisers.

During this quarter, the Chilliwack Firefighters Charitable Society donated to the BC Professional Firefighters Burn Fund, and to The Optimist Club of Chilliwack.
